

### **Hour of Code**

This week ISB held another successful Hour of Code week, where students of all ages had the opportunity to learn the basics of computer programming. Throughout the week, students practised computation thinking, played with and explored different computer science concepts, and completed a self-paced coding challenge in both Scratch and Javascript.

A huge part of the Hour of Code week is to demystify coding, and to show students that they can complete complex challenges if they pursue them in a logical way using computational thinking. The Hour of Code was a huge hit among the students, with many expressing excitement about the new skills they were learning. Some even said that they wanted to continue studying coding and pursue it as a future career. In-class lessons with Mr. Plotzki had kids building mechanical computers, creating pixel emojis, reading binary, coding up custom webapps in Javascript and many more fun, hands-on learning activities. A definite highlight of the week was the self-paced coding challenges. Students in elementary school completed a challenge to show how Taeguk can be kind online using the Scratch language. Students in secondary school got to participate in a self-paced Javascript course called Grasshopper to learn the foundations of coding like variables, loops, and conditional statements.

Overall, the Hour of Code week at the International School of Busan was a huge success, cementing the importance of this annual event. By providing students with the opportunity to learn about computer programming, the school is helping to achieve our vision of creating highly-skilled digitally literate learners for today's world.

#### Gifts for Staff Reminder

The Improper Solicitation and Graft Act is an anti-corruption law in South Korea. The school's law firm has advised us that there is a high possibility and likelihood that receiving any kind of gift in a teacher-student relationship would be considered as being in connection with performing a public servant's duty, and should not be done. Therefore, in order to prevent a violation of the Act, and to avoid even the suspicion of violating the Act, we request that parents or students do not give individual teachers or administrators any money or gifts, regardless of the value.

# From the School Counsellor

**Space for all emotions:** Children need space to express their emotions and need to feel close to their caregivers when they are feeling intense emotions like sadness, anger, or fear. We tend to be comfortable letting our children rejoice in happiness and excitement but are always tempted to rescue them from certain emotions. To understand and regulate emotions, children have to know what they are experiencing. How can we support them?

If they are having strong emotions, they are operating from a part of their brain that does not lend to making decisions or having rational conversations. First, get down at their level (literally kneel or squat down to their eye level) and make a connection. Offer a hug. Do not underestimate how powerful a hug can be.

Let them be with that emotion for a little while, and let them know that you are there for them "I am here for you", "This is really hard", "It is okay to be sad" "I will help you work it out" "I am listening", "I will be here when you are ready". Make a connection before you try correcting or fixing. Many times, making a heartfelt connection will be all that is needed.

Show curiosity about what your child is feeling throughout the day. "I am wondering if you are feeling joyful/disappointed/brave/confused/crabby/excited right now?" After they share with you, help them name what they described accurately. Ensure that they are learning the vocabulary for expressing emotions in your home language(s) and their language of instruction. If they have mixed feelings, let them know that it is normal and that feelings can be difficult to identify sometimes.

Validate and then try to respond to the emotion you have helped them name with your facial expressions, voice, and touch. For example, if they share that they are scared, maybe you gently grab their hand while talking. If they are ecstatic, jump up and down in joy with them.

Another way to help your children get better at labelling their feelings is to label characters' emotions in stories and shows. Have age-appropriate feelings charts printed to use during these empathy-building conversations. "How is that character feeling right now? Have you ever felt that way?" Or, "This reminds me of the time you were frustrated with your sister and threw your car against the wall. Do you remember?" The unique, loving bond between children and their caregivers is called attachment. Research on attachment shows that a key to developing secure and loving relationships is spending time with your children to support their experiences with their emotions. Discussing your children's feelings and sharing yours can strengthen your relationship with your children (Sources: The Greater Good Science Center at the University of California, Berkeley). 
# **Early Years Winter Celebration**

### **Kindergarten Explore Light**

As the daylight hours become shorter, Kindergarten children have been spending more time exploring the light table and blackroom in our class. We used the Magna Tiles and small lights to explore light and colours and make lamps that are different colours.









# **Grade 1 Inquire into Homes and Houses**

Grade 1 students have been researching houses and homes both in and out of the classroom. They have discovered houses from different time periods throughout history and made the connection that houses changed over time just like the students have changed over time. Students drew pictures of houses they found in different books and then came together and shared what they found.



# **Grade 2 Explore a Local Village**

The Grade 1 and 2 students had a wonderful time exploring a local village. Grade 1 students were learning about houses and homes while the Grade 2 students inquired into the materials all around them. Everyone tried their best to record this wonderful experience by using their iPads to take photographs. # Grade 3 Where We Are in Place & Time

Grade 3 learned about how explorers drew a grid on maps to help them navigate as part of our unit about Where We are in Place and Time. We then learned about coordinates on a grid with an x and y-axis. We used it to draw the maps of explorers. Then we used the Scratch program to do some coding and also saw the x and y coordinates in the coding program.



# **Grade 5 Trip to the Science Museum**

On Tuesday, Grade 5 students walked to the Busan National Science Museum to blast off into their space inquiry. Students were able to learn more about constellations by viewing a planetarium show and got to use telescopes to see the sun and sun flares through different filters. They also explored different exhibition halls to learn more about other scientific topics related to gravity, space, and other inquiry topics. Everyone had an amazing time exploring a new learning environment and applying what they already learned in class.



# **Question Formulation Technique**

Is asking questions a skill that needs to be learned? More specifically, is there an art to coming up with questions? Several teachers at ISB have explored this idea through professional development from The Harvard Graduate School of Education. They learned about the Question Formulation Technique which was developed to "strengthen people's ability to ask questions and participate in decisions that affect them...[so that people gain] a new sense of agency, confidence, and power." Students from middle school onwards were able to apply the



same technique in different subject areas. By honing students' ability to ask their own questions, we hope they will continue to be curious about the world around them and engage in a life-long search for answers.





Young learners learn through play.

What made you choose ISB? I was looking for a school that is truly international, offers the IB curriculum and values the early years of school as the important time they are. ISB is all that and is conveniently located by the sea which I am always happy to be near.

What is the best part of your job? Getting to observe, document, extend and nurture children's play opportunities. If a day ever seems challenging just visit an Early Years class and everything comes back into focus with a sense of fun and freedom.

What are your hobbies and interests? I enjoy yoga, music, design, reading, and being in nature and most recently I have embraced ocean swimming.

## What is your favourite quote?

I have many quotes I love but will go with this one by the great Bengali poet Rabindranath Tagore: "The real friendship is like fluorescence, it shines better when everything has darken."


